Unaccompanied & Homeless Youth

Students Experiencing Homelessness

May not consider themselves homeless or at risk of being homeless

Often unaware of available support services during high school

Face many educational challenges due to high mobility

May be confused about their postsecondary options and accessing financial aid for college

Require additional support as they transition into their postsecondary option

Students Experiencing Homelessness in Illinois

- According to the School House Connection Child and Youth Homelessness Data Profile for the 2022-2023 school year:
 - 56,005 or 3% of PreK – 12th grade students were identified as experiencing homelessness
 - Chronic absenteeism rate was 53.6% compared with 28.5% for the state average
 - High school graduation rate was 69.4% compared with 87.6% for the state average
 - Where students reported staying when identified as homeless:
 - Staying with others: 78.3%
 - Staying in a shelter: 7.9%
 - Staying in a hotel/motel: 5.5%

Definitions for FAFSA

- **Homeless:** Means lacking fixed, regular, and adequate housing, which includes living in shelters, parks, motels, hotels, public spaces, camping grounds, cars, abandoned buildings, or temporary living with other people because you had no where else to go. Also, living in any of these situations and fleeing an abusive parent, maybe considered homeless even if the parent would otherwise provide a place to live
- **Unaccompanied:** Means not living in the physical custody of a parent or guardian

Note: homelessness, on its own, does not qualify a student as being independent for federal student aid purposes

Providing a Mailing Address

- The mailing address on the FAFSA will be prefilled
- Students don't need to provide a home address, but they must provide a mailing address where you can reliably receive mail
- Their mailing address can be the address of a relative or friend or it can be their college's address

Receiving Homeless Youth Determination

- The list of people who can provide a determination has been expanded
- The following sources are:
 - Homeless District Liaison
 - Financial aid office from a different school that for the same or prior award year
 - Director or designee of a:
 - Transitional or emergency shelter
 - Street outreach program
 - Homeless youth drop-in center
 - Program serving individuals experiencing homelessness
 - Program supported by federal TRIO or GEAR UP grant

Public school districts must enter the name and contact information of their appointed McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison. This information may be used to contact the District Homeless Liaison to assist with immediate enrollment into the district and identification of McKinney-Vento eligibility. McKinney-Vento eligible students must be immediately enrolled and fully participating in school.

Not Having a Homeless Youth Determination

- If you answer “Yes” to the general unaccompanied and do not have a homeless youth determination from one of the individuals at an eligible agency from the previous slide, you may still submit the FAFSA form without parent information
- You will need to complete additional steps with the financial aid office before your eligibility for financial aid can be finalized

Homeless Youth Determinations and FAFSA Renewals

- Not to be confused with an unusual circumstance
- If the student does not have a determination, the FAA may make a case-by-case determination
- Renewal applicants with an eligible unaccompanied homeless youth determination on their 2025-2026 FAFSA, will have their answers to these questions carried over and pre-populated
 - Renewal applicants must still affirm that their previous answers to the dependency questions are still applicable

Student Unusual Circumstances

- If a student does not have a determination or meet the definition of experiencing homelessness and unaccompanied, but has an unusual circumstance, they can identify that here
- By answering yes, a student is considered a provisionally independent student

Student Unusual Circumstances

This information will help us evaluate the student's ability to pay for school.

Do unusual circumstances prevent the student from contacting their parents or would contacting their parents pose a risk to the student?

A student may be experiencing unusual circumstances if they

- left home due to an abusive or threatening environment;
- are abandoned by or estranged from their parents;
- have refugee or asylee status and are separated from their parents, or their parents are displaced in a foreign country;
- are a victim of human trafficking;
- are incarcerated, or their parents are incarcerated and contact with the parents would pose a risk to the student; or
- are otherwise unable to contact or locate their parents.

If the student's circumstances resulted in not having a safe and stable place to live, they may be considered a homeless youth and should review the answer to the previous question about being unaccompanied and homeless.

Provisionally Independent Student

- Designation for students who believe they may qualify as an independent student based on an unusual circumstance
- These students will:
 - Be able to submit the FAFSA
 - Receive an estimate SAI and Pell Grant
- A school's financial aid office will make the final determination based on documentation submitted
- These students will not be required to answer to answer information about their parent(s)

Updates for Institutions

- Institutions can now:
 - Use documentation from a previous year as acceptable documentation for another year (e.g., determination letter from a high school homeless district liaison)
 - Use documentation from another institution as acceptable documentation when verifying a student's circumstance (e.g., dependency override for a student who is experiencing homelessness)

Illinois Youth in Care

Students in Foster Care

Often hesitant to share their living situations

Often lack adult support

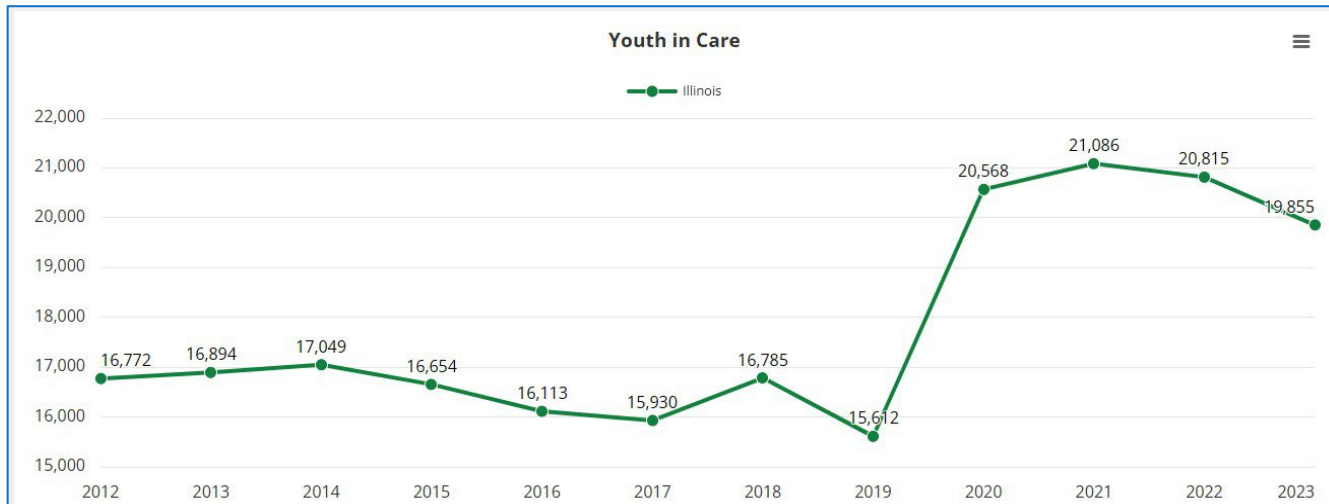
Require additional support as they transition into their postsecondary option

Lower rates of high school completion and employment

Less likely to earn a college degree

Illinois Data on Students in Foster Care

- According to the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), as of April 30, 2025, there are **17,741** total youth in foster care
 - 1,537 are over the age of 18
 - 3,611 are between the ages of 13-17
 - 5,750 are between the ages 6-12



Foster Care Question on FAFSA

- Students are asked if at any time since they turned 13 if they were in the foster care system
 - If yes, they are independent and will not be required to enter parent information
 - Foster care parents are **NOT** considered parents for purposes of financial aid

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Student Personal Circumstances

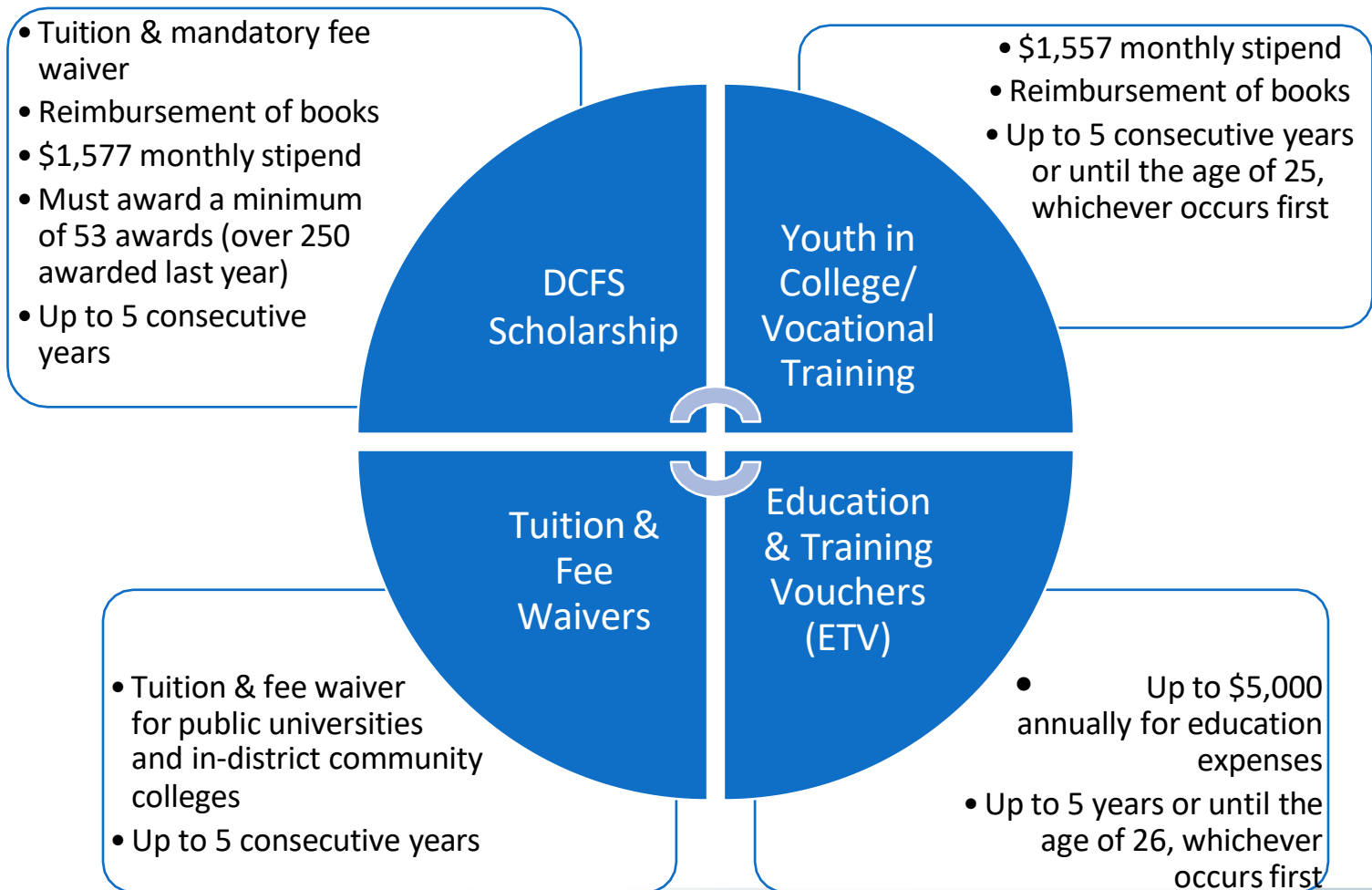

Illinois DCFS Postsecondary Programs

- The Illinois DCFS provides several programs for students are in or have aged out of the foster care system
- Each program has its own criteria and eligibility requirements
- Students can receive benefits from DCFS and receive a Monetary Award Program (MAP) Grant and/or Pell Grant

Support Services for Homeless and Foster Youth

- Institutions are increasingly collaborating with local housing authorities to address student homelessness
- IL HOUSE Liaisons
 - Each institution of higher education in IL is required to designate a member of staff to serve as a liaison to students experiencing homelessness and students in DCFS foster care
- Creation of on-campus food pantries
 - Open to all students on and off campus
- Youth in Care - College Advocate Program
 - Provides youth with foster care experience with ongoing support in navigating college life

RISE Act

Retention of Illinois Students & Equity (RISE) Act

- Signed into law on June 21, 2019
- Provides a pathway for **eligible undocumented students** who are disqualified from federal student aid to apply for ISAC, and other state funded financial aid programs
 - Including DCFS programs (except ETV program)
 - Relies on criteria already in state law that's used to determine eligibility for in-state tuition at public institutions

Note: The RISE Act does not exempt students from meeting existing program eligibility criteria

Eligibility Criteria for RISE Act 26-27

- Students enrolling in a term or semester that begins on or after July 1, 2026 must meet the criteria of either the high school pathway (1) or the high school community college pathway (2)
- High School Pathway
 1. Attended an Illinois high school in Illinois for at least 2 years
 2. Graduated from high school or received the equivalent of a high school diploma
 3. Resided in Illinois during high school and did not move out of Illinois prior to enrolling
 4. Provides an affidavit stating that they will file an application to be a permanent resident of the U.S. at the earliest opportunity they are eligible to do so
 5. Has not established a residence outside of Illinois

Eligibility Criteria for RISE Act 26-27

- High School and Community College Pathway
 1. Attended an Illinois high school and/or community college in Illinois for at least 2 years and attended a cumulative total of at least 3 years before enrolling at the university
 2. Graduated from high school or received the equivalent of a high school diploma and earned an associate degree or completed 60 transferrable credit hours
 3. Resided in Illinois during high school and/or community college and did not move out of Illinois prior to enrolling
 4. Provides an affidavit stating that they will file an application to be a permanent resident of the U.S. at the earliest opportunity they are eligible to do so
 5. Has not established a residence outside of Illinois

The Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid

- The application is the process for eligible students to apply for the Monetary Award Program (MAP) Grant only
- There are prescreening questions built into the application to determine which application a student should complete, *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA) or Alternative Application
- The application is patterned after the FAFSA:
 - A Student Aid Index (SAI) is calculated
 - Opens the same time as the FAFSA

Alternative Application Privacy Notice

- The information provided on the Alternative Application is used by ISAC to determine eligibility for state financial aid
- ISAC has strict security and confidentiality policies and procedures in place to protect the integrity of student records
- ISAC only shares student data with your school, for the purposes of awarding financial aid or for research purposes

Alternative Application Processing

- A completed Alternative App goes through ISAC for processing
- Unlike the FAFSA, the Alternative App is a state form and data elements are not matched with other agencies – eligibility for the Monetary Award Program (MAP) will be determined by the school the student attends
