FISCAL YEAR 2022 NURSE EDUCATOR FELLOWSHIPS

This grant helps nursing programs retain faculty members which helps to address the ongoing need for registered professional nurses in the workforce. Nursing schools in Illinois are struggling to retain their highly qualified educators due to the high number of faculty nearing retirement age and salary enticements offered by hospitals, clinics, and research facilities.

Fellowship funds are salary supplements that, at the discretion of the fellow, may be used for expenses related to professional development and continuing education. Awards are made to the participating higher education institution on behalf of the fellow. Institutions provide the salary supplement of \$10,000 to the fellow through their payroll system. Fellowships serve as an incentive to remain as faculty. In April 2019, the Illinois Nursing Workforce Center conducted a survey of prior fellows and reported that 96 percent are currently employed in nursing education. In addition, 84 percent are employed by the Illinois school that nominated the faculty member for the fellowship. This program is effective in retaining nurse educators.

At the June 8, 2021, Board meeting, the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) authorized the Executive Director to:

- 1) Notify eligible institutions when a state appropriation has been made;
- Determine eligibility of nursing schools and nominees; evaluate, score, and rank nominees; and select nominees for funding, pursuant to statute (110 ILCS 205/9.32) and the rules implementing the statute (23 III. Adm. Code 1105);
- 3) Distribute awards to nursing schools on behalf of fellows; and
- 4) Provide the Board with the list of nurse educators selected for funding and their nominating institutions.

This year is the first time that the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) considered equity data as part of the selection process. Additional consideration in the scoring was given to the proportion of nursing students who are African American, Latinx, low-income, first-generation college, from rural communities, working adults, or students with disabilities. In the future, consideration will be given to the institution's success in reducing any equity gaps in nursing student enrollment and graduation. Student data for enrollment and graduation at the nominating institutions was provided from the IBHE database. This data creates a baseline to identify equity gaps and chart future improvement.

Fellows may be asked to consult with the Illinois Board of Higher Education and the Illinois Nursing Workforce Center regarding statewide nursing issues. Each fellow will be responsible for preparing a final report that describes their fellowship experience.
