### **About HOUSE Liaisons**

- Required at all institutions of higher education by the Higher Education Housing and Opportunities Act
- Staff member designated to assist students experiencing homelessness and youth in care with campus and community resources
- HOUSE Liaisons:
  - Act as an intermediary between students and institution departments, such as financial aid and housing
  - Develop a plan to provide access to housing during academic breaks
  - Track graduation and retention rates for homeless students and youth in care
- If homeless student and youth in care population reaches 2% of student body after 3 years, institution must assign a staff member to primarily do HOUSE Liaison work

#### Mental Health Early Action on Campus (P.A. 101-251)

The Act includes five major initiatives to be developed on all public community college & university campuses in the state



- 1. Identify students in need of services and connect them to services;
- 2. Increase access to services and support;
- 3. Increase access to clinical service on campus and in surrounding communities;
- 4. Develop peer support services and trainings for students;
- 5. Provide technical assistance and training to reduce administrative barriers and undue burden on students



#### **MHEAC: Illinois Campus Cares Technical Assistance Center (ICC TAC)**

IBHE is charged with providing technical assistance and engaged SIU School of Medicine & UIC School of Social Work to implement on the agency's behalf.

- 1) Develop standardized policies for medical leave related to mental health conditions
- 2) Tailored support for universities reviewing related policies
- 3) Establish initial standards for policies and procedures
- 4) Disseminating best practices around peer support programs
- 5) Developing statewide standards and best practices for partnerships
- 6) Collecting, analyzing, and disseminating related data
- 7) Disseminating best practices related to housing data
- 8) Monitoring and evaluating linkage agreements
- 9) Facilitating a learning community
